WORK SCHEDULE



Labo Interns are assigned to two of Labo's district offices. As they explore Japan, they spend much of their time working with Japanese youth, helping out during international exchange programs, and assisting Japanese staff at the office. It is a great position for **outgoing, active individuals** eager to make friends!

A busy schedule does not mean there is no time to relax! Interns receive time off for any late night events, etc. they take part in, in addition to ten days of vacation and Japan's frequent calendar holidays.

HOMESTAY

Labo Interns live with the families of office staff, Labo Party members, or their leading Tutors. Each homestay typically lasts one to two months. The lifestyles and interests of your hosts may vary, but each family has a desire to welcome a young adult from abroad into their homes—to learn as their share languages, cultures and ideas.

Consistently using Japanese in their everyday life and experiencing the Japanese lifestyle first-hand, Labo Interns deepen their understanding of modern Japan. Host siblings and parents are instrumental in teaching Japanese etiquette and the proper context for using certain phrases. In some cases, people in the household cannot speak any English, so Labo Interns are encouraged to step up and improve their language skills!





CULTURAL STUDY PROJECT

While in Japan, Labo Interns are required to research a selected topic of traditional Japanese culture. Labo will assign Interns eight hours (one working day) per week for this research and assist with making any necessary arrangements. Labo also offers limited financial support for expenses related to the Cultural Study Project.

Ideas for projects include Tea Ceremony, Lacquerware, Ainu Fabric, Shamisen, and more! Projects that focus on aspects of modern Japanese society are also possible, with approval.
